GREG JEMSEK is delighted to announce the publication of his book *Quiet Horizon: Releasing Ideology and Embracing Self-Knowledge*. This book is written for people who want to pursue self-knowledge without committing to an ideology. It is for those who have explored ideologies and recognized that they have been asked to comply with authority rather than trust their own inner compass. Increasingly, people are foregoing the hard work of personal transformation by relinquishing their sovereignty to ideologies and their authorities. These ideologies can be secular or religious, focused on everything from politics to economics. Each time a person looks to such systems rather than to his own awareness, he begins a steady process of compromise. That compromise has been made easier over the last few decades because of 4 things: 1) Society's normalization of narcissistic behaviour, 2) The willingness of people to forego the work of forging genuinely intimate relationships, 3) The collective adoption of meta-narratives which portray a historically distorted view of human nature, and 4) A collective addiction to emotionally-based intensity as a substitute for genuine aliveness. The phenomenological account provided in this book recounts one person's desire to honour a childhood mystical experience - not through adhering to someone else's ideas about self-knowledge, but through directly engaging the world.

FELLOW IN FOCUS – KATRINE HILDYARD FGLF05



In 2005 **KATRINE HILDYARD FGLF05** was the first Union participant in the GLF. Inspired by the program Katrine said at the time "The GLF gives me great hope that our people, our size and enthusiasm will create positive and sustainable change on all of the issues affecting our community". After becoming a Fellow of the GLF Katrine completed the High Impact for Women in Leadership program in 2009. Katrine believed this program made a difference to her personal style of leadership saying, 'High Impact gives women leaders the opportunity to explore different views and styles of leadership and an array of leadership challenges – particularly those women face... The High Impact journey has included intense discussion, reflective practice, creative mechanisms to gain feedback on one's own leadership and practical opportunities to collaboratively consider current key issues.'

Katrine has worked with the Australian Services Union for almost fifteen years and became the Branch Secretary in 2009. She has worked strategically to build the Union's influence in key industries, develop strong partnerships and modernise the Union's structures, processes and focus. Katrine is demonstrating great leadership and is passionate about great working conditions, a fair and just society and strong and sustainable industries for the generations to come.

She is currently one of the key leaders of a groundbreaking pay equity case and campaign to address the issue of low wages in the community services sector.

She has more recently become a member of the Premier's Council for Women which provides leadership and advice in the interest and needs of women. She is also a Board member of the South Australian Community Services and Health Skills Board, the Business Services Industry Skills Board and participates in a range of national and state forums. Katrine was a 2020 Summiteer in the Social Inclusion stream and is also a Director of Local Super.

More broadly, she has been an active member of her community for many years, with an ongoing commitment to furthering the interests of young women and ensuring respect and fairness for those affected by mental illness. Katrine is currently standing for re-election as Branch Secretary at the ASU.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ARTICLE – MARKETING YOURSELF FOR BOARD ROLES

This month we are delighted to include the following article, penned by our Board member Kay Hannaford-Seamark and reviewed by our Chairman, Colin Dunsford. This article is particularly timely as over 30 GLF Alumni were notified in the past week of available positions on NFP Boards. If you are interested in hearing about available NFP Board positions please update your details in the GLF database opting into the GLF Community Board program.



Being appointed to a Board can be an exciting and fulfilling opportunity to contribute to an organisation at a strategic leadership level. If this is something you aspire to do, there are several ways to prepare yourself.

One is to put yourself forward for local sporting, school or community committee roles. Colin Dunsford, the Leaders Institute's current Chairman, began his board career (quite inadvertently) by volunteering to be treasurer at his old scholars' football club. Other members of that committee also went on to become prominent business leaders who, when they needed board members, invited Colin because they knew his capabilities and trusted him.

Networking is very important. It's not just who you know, but who knows (and thinks highly of) *you*. To borrow a phrase I love, *gather your choir* (those who sing your praises!) and let them know you are seeking board positions and what you are interested in and passionate about.

Another option is to join the Institute of Company Directors and do the Company Directors course. It's not essential, but it is valuable in helping you to understand corporate governance issues and the role and duties of being a board member.

Sometimes you may be approached for Board roles. It can be flattering to be invited and you invariably accept, hoping to be able to contribute something. Even in this instance, it is important to clarify why you have been approached and what the board's expectations are of your participation. If it's a not a match or a priority for you, you can always say 'No, thanks'.

Unless you are approached because someone already knows your capabilities or knows you personally, you may need to market yourself.

You can always put your name and details forward on registers of people interested in and available for Board positions.

Applying for a Board position however is different from applying for a job, so your normal resume will not necessarily do the trick.

Just as you would tailor your resume (and not just the covering letter) for each different job you apply for, ideally the same principle holds when applying for Board roles. So having generic details on a register is not necessarily going to get you a board position.

Here are a few points to consider:

- Ask yourself “Why do I want this position?” If it is primarily to bolster your resume, the chances are you will not persuade anyone that you are the ideal candidate.

If, on the other hand, you want to make a real difference in a specific way and this particular board will enable you to do that, you're on the right track.

In other words, seeking a board position *as a means to an end*, rather than as an end in itself, will make your application a lot more compelling.

- As GLF alumni, you automatically have a unique selling proposition – so sell it! Say what you gained from participating in the GLF and how you are contributing to South Australia's development as a result. In particular, promote the skills you acquired that would make you a valuable board contributor.

Match your skills and experiences to those the organisation is seeking in its new board member(s). If you don't know what they are, ask.

- In writing your resume, keep your work experience to a minimum - overview only. Resist the urge to over-promote yourself with so many strings to your bow that you look too busy to do justice to this position. Paint yourself as a well-rounded person with vision, passion and a genuine interest in the organisation and its goals.

Consider adding a one page resume (see the board members' one-pagers on the Leaders Institute website) as a way of doing this. Google other organisations or non-executive directors you admire to see how they present themselves.

If your resume is more than 3 pages, you will need to go back and sharpen your focus – and your editing pencil!

- Remember, if the board position you are seeking goes to someone else, it may simply be that the organisation is seeking different skills at this time. Ask for feedback and find out if there is something you can address that will make your next application successful.

The Hon Dame Silvia Cartwright PCNZM, DBE, QSO, DStJ, Thursday 9 June 2011, Adelaide Town Hall, 128 King William Street, Adelaide, 5.30pm for a **6.00pm start**



A former Governor General of New Zealand, Judge Cartwright is well known for defending human rights through the United Nations, for furthering international justice, and for her deep analysis of the victim experience. She has described the purpose of international trials as 'to end impunity, promote peace and reconciliation, punish those who have perpetrated proven mass crimes, and achieve justice for victims'. In this address, Judge Cartwright will consider the utility of international criminal trials against the backdrop of the Cambodian experience (1975-9) and others.

The Hon Dame Silvia Cartwright was the first female Chief District Court Judge and the first woman to be appointed to the High Court in New Zealand. She went on to become the Governor-General of New Zealand. She is now one of two international trial judges in the five member Trial Chamber of the ECCC, a court established by the Cambodian government and the United Nations to try senior members of the Khmer Rouge and those most responsible for the crimes that occurred in Cambodia between 1975 and 1989.
